Dear parents and carers,

This week we celebrate NAIDOC Week. The theme this year is:

Always Was,

Always Will Be.

'Always Was, Always Will Be' recognises that First Nations people have occupied and cared for our continent for over 65000 years.

This country was criss-crossed by generations of brilliant Nations.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people were Australia's first explorers, first navigators, first engineers, first farmers, first botanists, first scientists, first diplomats, first astronomers and first artists.

Australia has the world's oldest oral stories. The First Peoples engraved the world's first maps, made the earliest paintings of ceremony and invented unique technologies. They built and engineered structures structures on Earth - predating well-known sites such as the Egyptian Pyramids and Stonehenge.

Their adaptation and intimate knowledge of Country enabled them to endure climate change, catastrophic droughts and rising sea levels. (Naidoc.org.au)

NAIDOC 2020 invites all Australians to embrace the true history of this country - a history which dates back thousands of generations.

#### **Remembrance Day**

Wednesday 11th November is Remembrance Day and this year marks the 102nd anniversary of the end of the First World War. ANZAC day remains our national day of commemoration but Remembrance Day still has special significance. At 11:00am on the 11th November, 1918, the guns on the Western Front, finally fell silent, signifying the end to the 4yrs of bitter fighting 1914 -1918. Since the end of WW1, Australia has been involved in a range of conflicts from the devastation of World War 2 to Afghanistan and Iraq along with the many Peacekeeping operations throughout the world. Remembrance Day is an opportunity to pause for a minute to thank, all those men and women who have helped preserve our freedom and the freedom of others. Please take the time to remember all those who have served and those that continue to do so. Especially the men and women who have given their tomorrow for our today. Lest we Forget.

**Out of School Care** 

We want to offer families more flexibility with their work commitments and child care arrangements and to create more opportunities across the whole community. Having Out of School Hours Care available at local schools is a great way to achieve this.

Year 3, Year 5 and Year 6 students of 1-6 Emerald are reversed integrated into their mainstream classrooms where they participate in social and fun activities with their classroom teachers.

# **PDHPE - Life Skills**

During our lessons for PDHPE, we have focused on Life Skills. These simple activities enable students to develop their fine motor skills, social and

emotional wellbeing, and develop important skills when completing primary school and high school. The boys in 1-6E have been learning how to tie their shoe laces, how to make a sandwich, how to wipe up and pack away objects, how to pay for certain foods or goods from the canteen, how to wash their hands, how to butter toast, how to make their own cereal and how to make a cake which are important aspects of daily living.

# Welcome to Our Learning in 5/6 Magenta

In 5/6 Magenta, we have been exploring ways to make our learning visible. We are using a variety of strategies to broaden our understanding of our own learning and determine 'where we are at' and 'where to next' with our learning. Each lesson begins with a 'Learning Intention/WALT' statement and a clear set of success criteria to guide our learning. Exit slips are also used at the end of the lesson to help us self-reflect on our learning.

In **English** this term, we have been reading a Science Fiction book called, 'The City of Ember', by Jeanne De Prau. We have completed a predicting activity,

created a glossary to extend our vocabulary, an activity about the setting of the story and a visualising activity. For reading group activities, we have been focusing on what makes good readers by using the comprehension strategies of making connections, summarising, questioning, visualising, and predicting to improve our understanding. Activities for reading groups include, BTN-for summarising, a School Magazine article-visualising, ReadWorks article a day-questioning, Reading Records, where we recorded our own reading and self-assess where we can improve and

set learning goals. Each day we complete one activity for our groups set task. By Sienna



In Maths, we have been working on increasing our number sense by completing Number Talks and strengthening our mental computation and reasoning skills. We have also been using Essential Assessment to help us identify which areas of our Maths are our strengths and which are areas for improvement.





### This term, Stage 3 are doing Music!

In 5/6M, we are learning to; make compositions, use Garage Band and create our own beats! During our last lesson, we used Garage Band to create an eight bar beat. First, we recorded our names using a sampler, then we added a keyboard, bass and drums! By Gracie

For Visual Art in 5/6M this term, we have been working on portraits of people that inspire us. Some people are doing family members, friends and inspiring people like sports people, artists, musicians, actors, authors and illustrators. By Bella and Eadie



#### Science



Here in 5/6M us scientists have been studying different types of energy, with our mad professor Mr Frade. We have learnt that potential energy is energy stored away waiting to be used, and kinetic energy is generated by anything moving, plus much more. We've also learnt the story of William Kamkwamba, a South African boy who created a windmill made of old parts to power his town electricity, grinding food and pumping water.





Last term we explored the different properties of the 'States of Matter'. We had fun making Ooblek. Did you know that Ooblek is a Non-Newtonian substance? That

means it's a fluid that changes viscosity. It turns solid when force is applied. By Arlo and Aydon



For Sport, we have been learning some Indigenous Games. We have been developing a greater understanding and appreciation of Indigenous culture. Over the years sport has played a major role in developing a socially cohesive environment within Indigenous communities. ## Driving and parking safely near your school

Thousands of families drive their children to school every week in NSW. Safety is a priority for everyone. Parents and carers are responsible for their child's safety when travelling to and from school.

When travelling in the car ensure your child:

is correctly buckled up with a seatbelt or child car seat
always gets in and out of the car through the 'safety door'. This is the rear door on the footpath side of the car

is never left alone in the car.



The beginning and end of the school day are busy times for pedestrians and drivers outside schools.

You can help keep children safe by remembering the following:

• drop your child off and pick them up on the school side of the road

• never call out to them from across the road - it is very dangerous

always take extra care in 40km school zones

• follow all parking signs - these help keep your child as safe as possible

• park responsibly even if it means you have to walk further to the school gate

• never double park - it is illegal and puts children at risk

• never do a U-turn or a three point turn outside the school as it puts children at risk of harm

 model safe and considerate pedestrian and driver behaviours to your child

• always give way to pedestrians particularly when entering and leaving driveways.
